# A FEW WORDS FROM FR. JOE.....

We had a family Bible in our home for as long as I can remember. It was a big white book, with a padded cover, illustrated with many biblical scenes and very heavy. It sat untouched on a bookcase. To the best of my knowledge it wasn't read, no one took it down from the shelf, found a passage of Scripture to read alone or aloud. It was always there, we had a Bible but nothing more. As a family, all 9 of us went to Sunday Mass, at first we had little black missals to help us participate in the New Mass when it was translated into English and then a bit later a Sunday missal with the readings for every week, mine had gold edges, I liked it very much. But even then the family Bible sat on the shelf, unloved. We often talked about the homily, or sermon, in the car going home from Mass, but we rarely referred back to the actual Word of God. I think this lack of attentiveness to the Scriptures was fairly common in Catholic homes, we listened to the priest, but not so much to the Lord. In recent years there has been a Mass leaflet to help us worship, both to follow the reading of the Word and respond to the prayers. I often suggest during the announcements that it would be good to carry the leaflet home and continue to read the scripture during the week, it's so hard to take it all in during Mass. But most leaflets are discarded at the tables and dropped into the green bin on Monday. To be honest I rarely do it myself so I'm not surprised that parishioners are not inclined to do so. During the week someone left a family Bible, just like ours, at the back of the Church. It contained a handwritten note, painfully sad words. They said simply that the writer was returning the Bible in protest at the abuse of a family member by a priest and the cover up by the church of this man. I wept when I read this note. I don't think that bible was much read either, God's Word condemning those who would harm a child is within those pages. All God's Commandments are there, all the instructions to the Christian community, all the hope and promise of eternal life. The Bible needs to be read, the scriptures are vital to a healthy Christianity. Maybe recovering God's Word will be a step on the road to healing the past hurts and rebuilding trust with people. Please pray for the family who have returned their Bible that God's grace and love will touch their hurt and heal them, and that the Church will reform.

This we ask, through Christ our Lord,


