A FEW WORDS FROM FR. JOE.....

Spread out! It's very natural when we come into any public building or area, we like to spread out. No one likes to sit too close to their neighbour, people often tend to find a familiar place, a seat that they can almost call their own. This is all very normal and to be expected. Even at home we tend to spread out through the house, inside and out, upstairs and down, living room, kitchen, bedroom, wherever we can find some space. In our house that was fine, until you were called to eat. At that point, everyone came to the table, took their place and shared in the mealtime, sharing stories of the day, passing food, feeding the little ones, trying not to make a mess, giving everyone a chance to participate. We came to the table individually but we ate together and then everyone headed off to do their own things when the meal was over.

Coming to Mass also asks us to think about how we gather, what we do for each other when we gather as the parish for prayer. This Church on Bird Ave is pretty big, it was designed for 1720 people seated and maybe a few more standing, perhaps it can hold 2,000. If it was full we would have to use every available space, seat and bench and that would feel great. But what about when only 40, 50, or 60 people gather on a weekday, or 120-300 on a Sunday. If we use the whole space, spread ourselves out, sit at the back to be Parish Office near the door and stay far from the altar what does it say about our sharing in the prayer of the Mass together? For me it doesn't feel like a community gathered to join with the priest in praying the Mass.

So I think we need to decide on what part of the Church to use when the numbers are small. We need to commit to the gathering, to being together like the family sharing the meal. We could experiment with different altars, or seating arrangements, or rooms, but I don't think we can continue as we are. The priest who celebrates needs to be able to see and hear the parishioner. The opposite to "Spread out" is to say "Come closer, gather round", will you do that?
