One group of children were heard talking about the things they'd do without and the familiar giving up of sweets, crisps, chocolate and ice cream will have the local shops in a sweat. So maybe it's worth mentioning that Lent happens in the secular world and within the Christian community at the same time, but in very different ways. For the world at large Lent can be a positive moment for self-reflection, for thinking more of others and being aware of people in need. In the faith community, it is all about God! Imagine. But yes, this is a season rooted in scripture and tradition. God has created us for perfection, we stumble and fall, lose sight of the one who loves us unconditionally and stray. Lent calls us back.
