We prayerfully remember all those who are Recently Deceased and whose Anniversaries occur at this time. May all our faithfully departed rest in peace. Amen. During his general audience last Wednesday, Pope Francis invited all Christians and people of other faiths to join him in prayer. The Holy Father also invited people of no faith, but with a heart for peace, to join him as they see fit. Warning against a humanitarian catastrophe, he said, "War does not solve any problems, it only sows death and destruction. It increases hatred, multiplies revenge. War erases the future."

The Holy Father's words at the end of his audience were: "Today too, dear brothers and sisters, our thoughts turn to Palestine and Israel. The number of victims is rising and the situation in Gaza is desperate. Please, let everything possible be done to avoid a humanitarian disaster.

"The possible widening of the conflict is disturbing, while so many war fronts are already open in the world. May weapons fall silent! Let us heed the cry for peace of populations, of the people, of the children! Brothers and sisters, war does not solve any problem: it sows only death and destruction, foments hate and proliferates revenge. War cancels out the future. I urge believers to take just one side in this conflict: that of peace. But not with words – with prayer, with total dedication.

## A Few Words from Fr Joe.....

It's Halloween already! For the past few weeks we've all seen neighbours and friends decorating their homes and gardens, some with attractive orange autumnal wreaths and pumpkins and others with seriously scary ghouls, ghosts, webs and skeletons. Autumn leads us naturally into winter, the trees are bare, the fields empty and the light is diminishing day by day. The cycle of nature spells out dying and death and faces us with the reality that all living things are mortal, including ourselves.

The scary creatures invite us to think about the fate of the souls of the dead, do they actually roam around in the dark, frightening the living? I think not. The Christian message suggests a destination for our immortal souls, placing both heaven and hell as final resting places. The optimists among us feel that hell is empty and in God's heavenly home there is a place for us all. It can fun to scare us in the Halloween spirit, but there is good reason to take comfort and join the Masses on the Feast of All Saints on November 1<sup>st</sup> and All Souls. It is equally helpful to sit and write an Altar List of the Dead and join the names of those you remember together with the rest of the parish so that we can offer Masses for the happy repose of their souls. Unlike the message of Halloween, we believe that the souls of the dead rest in peace.



November Altar List of the Dead is one of the many ways in which we remember our deceased relatives and friends, and join our intentions in the Masses the priests offer for the repose of their souls. Please take a November Altar List of the Dead (Available at the back of the Church). Place your completed List in one of the envelopes provided and return it to the basket **or**, you can pop them into the post box outside St. Joseph's or, if it is open, leave them in the Sacristy. The names of all those on the Altar List of the Dead are included in the 1<sup>st</sup> Friday Masses throughout the year.
