
## A few words from Fr Joe.....

During the week, I spent a couple of hours reviewing a large parish file from 1999. That's just 25 years ago, yet it read like something from another era in history. In the file, there were some pretty strong letters from parishioners and the wider community expressing very different opinions and maybe some hostility to the planned actions. Through all of that, and over time, the priests, committee and the wider parish made progress, completed a major project and the file was closed.

My impression of the parish, as the new millennium began, was a fairly stable, active and progressive faith community, embedded within the wider culture, strong, confident and purposeful. I guess that was the end of an era. In the past 25 years so much has changed, firstly vocations to religious life and the priesthood have all but disappeared. The revelations about abuse within the church have been unfolding constantly. Then over time parishioners have become time poor and less inclined to generate activities around the faith community or church. The wider culture has changed, becoming more secular and progressive and with inward migration much more diverse. Levels of participation in parish and attendance at the sacraments are drastically reduced.

When I heard that a new series of Big House Revival has been commissioned I did stop and wonder if that's the sort of objective we have here for the church. Are we hoping that if we hang on for long enough there will be a surge of interest in how we used to live, when big was beautiful? But then I read the Archbishop's pastoral letter which sees smallness as the likely next phase of our common life. The Building Hope process asks us to think, talk and act in a positive and Spirit filled way. It seems that different isn't better or worse, it's still our church, our parish, in partnership, promoting the joys of living Gospel values.
