## A Few Words From Fr Joe.....



Jacinta Mc Manus was the first person to send me a Valentine's Day Card. I was in sixth class, 12 years old. It was a big one! It came in a white box and had a red heart on the front, shiny satin, like a pin cushion, a bit squidgy. Understandably I've long since forgotten what was written on the inside, and my first 'romance' came and went all too quickly, but strangely I've never forgotten her name, it still brings a smile and good feeling. I guess most people have memories of meeting romantic love for the first time, perhaps in adolescence, and carrying that experience all through life. It's wonderful to find love, and reciprocate it and grow together, maybe just for a short time, or perhaps for a lifetime.

One of the great joys in pastoral ministry is meeting couples preparing for marriage, especially those whose wedding I've been invited to celebrate. We tend to meet five times, an initial meeting to get to know each other, then one to complete the Pre Nuptial Enquiry form which establishes freedom to marry and a shared understanding of the Catholic theology underpinning the Sacrament and the life of the couple. Then we sit down to prepare the liturgy, with or without Mass and closer to the actual day we have a rehearsal. Finally, we meet at the church to celebrate the wedding liturgy, always a beautiful occasion with the church decorated, the readings and prayers shared, the music performed and then the exchange of vows which is at the heart of the celebration. During the last 40 years I've never ceased to be uplifted by the love of each couple, the way they speak about each other, how they have come know and cherish what matters to the one they've chosen to share their whole life with. It's always fun to hear about how they got engaged, shared the news with family and then set the date. A church wedding offers so much, the setting, the Sacrament, the tradition and a solid foundation on which to build family life.

Most of the marriages I've participated in have led to welcoming children, taking on parenting and sharing a busy life that passes so quickly. Some have had rocky patches and a few have broken down. No two brides have ever looked the same and each couple have their unique way of showing love and respect. Families for the greater part have been an invaluable support to the newlyweds and the circle of friends has always been essential. As we mark Valentine's Day and mention the work of **ACCORD** we can all commit to being promoters of the Sacrament of Marriage and supporters of all the newlyweds we meet.
