A Few Words from Fr Joe.....

I am convinced that the Spirit of God moves powerfully among us all in this Easter Season. The experience of meeting Jesus risen from the dead transformed his frightened and disillusioned disciples. As soon as the penny dropped that he had in fact escaped from death and that he returned to them to share his new life they found the inner courage to carry on being his disciples. They came out of hiding, bravely challenged the very people who put him to death and ignored the instructions from the old religious leaders to be silent.

Remember the early church is the source of our renewal in faith and action at this time. This is also the season of the year when we Confirm our 6th class children and have First Holy Communion with 2nd class. Is there any connection between celebrating these special days with primary school children, their parents, godparents, grandparents and family and the Spirit filled Easter Season? I think there is. These two special occasions come from the time of the Lord's Passion, Death and Resurrection. The first Eucharist comes from the Passover meal he shared with his disciples the night before he died, and the gift of the Holy Spirit was shared on the morning that he rose from the dead.

Our families, schools and the parish are experts in educating the children about the meaning of these moments. No child is in any doubt that the Communion they receive is anything other than Jesus present in bread and wine. No candidate for Confirmation is ignorant of the gifts and fruits of the Holy Spirit and the scripture passages that share this story with us. Each and every one of these celebrations are joyful moments in our common parish life, we are all blessed when these families come and worship here.

Parishioners who do come to Sunday mass often comment on the disconnect between these special days when all are happy to be in the church, and the ordinary Sundays of the year when so few return to pray, praise and celebrate here. Sometimes that conversation is asking, 'Why don't they come back?' I believe we need to hold up the great Easter mirror and ask ourselves about how we are all responding to the challenge Jesus gave to his first followers, 'Go out into the whole world and share the Good News'. Renewal in the Easter season enlivens the whole church and makes what we do week by week more authentic, attractive and effective. And yes, like the first disciples, we might have to speak out with courage, challenge the world around us and give witness to our conviction that Christ is alive and living among us.
