A Few Words from Fr Joe.....

I had just sent in my few words last week when the news of the death of Sinead O'Connor was broadcast. I've listened to a lot of commentary and read endless tributes during the week, some have given me cause to pause and think. Personally, I didn't come across any tributes, or critique, from a Bishop or church leaders, Catholic or of any other faith. At one level that's no surprise and at another it might be a missed opportunity. She certainly was a woman with a unique and significant faith dimension to her life but orthodox she wasn't.


Sinead's death clearly touched a nerve and the comments focused a lot on her 'prophetic' and critical voice. Clearly, she had a unique ability to channel her own troubles, struggles, joys and pain, into words, sung and spoken. She lived through the decades of recent social change in Ireland, with huge shifts in the rights and freedoms that women exercise in the Ireland of today. Some of that shift is at the price of Catholic orthodoxy being normative not just for those of us who follow a faith journey but for our collective culture and laws nationally. Some see that as her achievement, others will lament the loss of past certainties.

The first song I heard played after she died was from an early appearance on the Late Late Show. Many have commented on her close bond with Gay Byrne, and he certainly showed her tenderness and respect. The song was 'Make Me a Channel of Your Peace', such a familiar hymn of the 80's and her interpretation really made the words of St Francis come alive. It finished with the words 'and it is dying that we are born to eternal life'. Hearing it so soon after her death, and before the huge coverage in the media, left me wondering if her search for religious meaning had brought her to a deeper sense God, of heaven, of now being born into eternal life?

Among the many images of her, youthful, defiant, dressed as a priest and in the appropriate garments of a Muslim woman, her eyes remain unchanged, alert and compassionate. On her right hand, I noticed she had the words "Lumen Christi" etched in ink, a daily reminder of her attachment to the redeemer, the Son of God, the light of the world. I too am a believer but would hesitate to make such a public declaration for all to see. She was and is an enigma, a woman who we all knew in some guise, and whose passion for justice, struggle for freedom and commitment to causes could be inspiring. She was also controversial, disrespectful to authority, behaved badly and wounded even those she loved. She certainly leaves us all with a lot to think about and reflect on. May her gentle soul find peace.
