A Few Words from Fr Joe.....

During a recent trip to France, my sister and I lined up to pay into an Abbey. I could see that the admission was €7.50 for adults, and €6.00 for Seniors. Standing waiting as the line shuffled forward I prepared my €15, which I handed over with a friendly "merci". Well my joy turned to amazement when without a word, a single question to ascertain whether my sister, two years older than I had in fact already turned 65, the young lady at the cash desk handed me two tickets and €3 change. One look at the pair of us and without hesitation, clarification or even a wink or a nod, she rang up the till with a pair of Senior tickets and called "next!" And just like that I went from being a 'young priest' to an old man and moved along.

And so it is that life passes us by so quickly. It doesn't feel like so long ago that my sister and I had to produce ID to be served a drink, or that it was a student card that got the discount, not the presumption of now being a Senior. I'm sure many people also have that experience of days turning into weeks, into months and then literally the years fly by.

The holiday rest, Sunday afternoon down time or even a walk in the woods or park, can give us time to stop and take account of life's events and the things that really matter. For myself I'm amazed at how little I've learnt, changed or matured now that I can count 50 years of my life in the category of an adult! I guess we all develop and change a bit as we grow older, but in essence we have the same personality, habits, talents and quirks which really don't change much.

Walking around the Monastery I was struck by how nearly 1,000 years had passed since the first men met in this location and dedicated their lives to a God, who also hasn't changed. The worshiped him with the song, work and prayer, much like the community there today. The Mass they offered hasn't changed in essence, just in language and rubric, but it remains faithful to what Jesus did at the Last Supper. So maybe change is over rated! It is being faithful that matters, to God, to each other and to making the world a better place day by day. We certainly need the presence of a God who never changes, who will always be there for us and within us.



Reflection for Sunday 15 October 28th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Today's readings offer us more insight and wisdom of the call to synodality, which is currently being discerned at the Universal Synod in Rome.

In writing to the early church in Philippi, Paul reminds them, not only of his own situation, but of his call to 'servant leadership'. This service is modelled on that of Jesus himself, who came not to be served but to serve. In this way, Paul not only talks about the grace of God in Christ but illustrates the grace by his freely given, loving service. This grace allows him to take courage and strength that, with God, anything is possible and achievable.

Paul's 'servant' style of leadership encourages the members of that early church community to give freely and generously. This Christian way of living is often counter-cultural. The Synod Working Document also says 'The radical call is, therefore, to build together, synodally, an attractive and grounded Church: an outgoing Church, in which all feel welcome'.

It can be very easy to find a variety of excuses not to do this but, like Paul, we can trust that 'there is nothing we cannot master with the help of the One who gives us strength.'
