### **Trinity of Faith**

The name and logo for our partnership chosen is **Trinity of Faith and the logo is displayed here.** 



The Trinity Symbol, in yellow captures the spirit of the three communities working together, and symbolises Divinity, Light and Hope. The Cross which overlaps the Trinity symbol is the core Christian sign and points towards the centrality of faith and the unity we share in the redemptive love of Jesus. The circular arrangement of the names of the three parishes around the symbols indicates our intention to work together with unity of belief, life and practice. The symbol and text are placed in a strong border circle for strength and visual unity. We are deeply indebted to those who undertook this task and did it so well. #### A Few Words from Fr Joe.....

Front page pictures in daily papers often catch in a single image a life event that we can all relate too. Images often triggers memories, touches our hearts and brings us back to a time in place in our own lives that we can never forget.
